



## DiLSeY Train-the-Trainer Program Concludes Successfully



The DiLSeY (Digital Literacy to Secure Yourself), Cybercrimes Awareness, Train-the-Trainer program, organised by the Society for Cyberabad Security Council (SCSC) in collaboration with Cyberabad Police, concluded on a high note after two engaging days focused on building cyber awareness and practical skills.

Led by Ragu Kannan, Joint Secretary – Cyber Security Forum, SCSC, the program brought together trainers and volunteers for interactive sessions on real-world cyber challenges.

On Day 1, DCP Sai Manohar shared insights into the latest financial cybercrimes through real-life cases, highlighting how quickly such frauds are evolving. Naved Khan, CEO SCSC spoke about the positive role of the internet in everyday life, while Bhanu Murthy, Associate Director SCSC conducted an engaging session on social media crimes, cyberbullying, and sextortion. Mr. Ragu Kannan also emphasized the importance of digital parenting, offering practical tips for families. Sessions on AI safety, deepfakes, and emerging cyber threats were led by Ms. Krishnaveni, Cyber Security Forum Lead.

Day 2 focused on practical awareness—ranging from digital footprints and fake news to online gaming risks, and social engineering scams. Mr. Riyaz Uddin, Cyber Security Forum Lead, kept the sessions interactive and participant-driven on Cyber Laws. Sandeep Raj, SI, and Mounika, SI, explained the latest financial frauds and how to report them effectively, including the use of the 1930 cybercrime helpline.

Cyberabad CP Dr. M. Ramesh said people should be very careful about cyber frauds. He advised not to click on unknown links or download APK files from untrusted sources, as these are common tricks used by fraudsters. He explained that cyber criminals work in strong networks and can



easily trap people. If anyone becomes a victim of cybercrime, they should immediately call 1930. He said the “golden hour” is very important, and quick action can help in recovering money. He also suggested that everyone should spread awareness to at least 10 people around them so that more people stay safe.

Also Mr. Ramesh Kaza, Secretary General, SCSC, shared effective tips for safe smartphone usage and highlighted SCSC as the world's unique public-private partnership model.

SCSC also recognised its best-performing volunteers through a felicitation ceremony, where they were honoured by the Commissioner of Police and Secretary General.

The program concluded with a Q&A session addressed by Mr. Naved Khan, CEO SCSC & DCP Cybercrimes Sri. Sai Manohar and distribution of certificates. With its interactive approach and real-life case discussions, the initiative continues to empower individuals to become responsible digital citizens and cyber safety ambassadors.
